HHRD in Indonesia

HHRD works globally, focusing on countries where most of the population lives below the poverty line. HHRD has successful relief and development programs in Indonesia, including seasonal Ramadan activities, poverty alleviation, orphan support, and medical care. In addition, HHRD has been working with partner organization PKPU to help Indonesia recover from the 2018 tsunamis. PKPU Human Initiative is an NGO that provides relief assistance in food, clothing, and shelter. In the two years since the tragedy, PKPU has engaged in sustainable development projects and socio-economic development support.

HHRD Status

HHRD operates several programs in Indonesia through partner NGOs, such as Orphan Support, Water For Life, Water And Sanitation Hygiene, and Seasonal projects for local Indonesians and Rohingya Refugees. Since 2009, HHRD has intervened in six disaster relief efforts. In addition, helping Hand USA has launched Emergency Relief Efforts in Indonesia to help provide immediate assistance through water, food, medicine, and shelter relief. More recently, HHRD, through vetted partner NGOs, provided disaster response relief distribution of essential items for families suffering in the aftermath of the 6.2 magnitude earthquake that rocked the West Sulawesi province of Indonesia on January 15, 2021.









Country Context

The Indonesian archipelago is located in a region highly prone to natural disasters, especially earthquakes and tsunamis, volcanic eruptions, floods, droughts, landslides, and cyclones. The impacts of these disasters, including deaths, injuries, and other health risks, material losses, and destruction of public infrastructure, interfere with national development. More than 97% of Indonesians live in disaster-prone areas. Tsunamis in September and December of 2018 crushed the coastal areas, killing many and displacing thousands. A series of earthquakes accompanied the flooding, less than two months apart, one right after another. Landslides were triggered by the flooding months later. In the final months of 2020, volcanic eruptions caused residents to flee rural villages on Java island. Then, on January 15, 2021, Sulawesi was struck by a powerful earthquake, causing loss of life and displacement.
