HHRD in Jordan

HHRD works globally with a particular focus in countries where most of the population lives below the poverty line. HHRD has successful relief and development programs in Jordan, including seasonal Ramadan activities, poverty alleviation, and orphan support. HHRD donates winter relief packages, including nonperishable food, clothing, and medical supplies to Syrian refugees in Lebanon and Jordan. We build orphanages and construct shelter homes in remote settlements and refugee camps. In addition, we partner with the World Health Organization to provide medical services, including Mother-Child Health Centers, Mobile Medical Units, and medical training. HHRD funds the education of Syrian refugees in Jordan and Lebanon with family education scholarships. Our Youth Empowerment Program, Youth for Jordan, provides young people from the United States with valuable experience with humanitarian internships and fieldwork trips.

HHRD Status

HHRD's Middle East North Africa (MENA) office in Jordan has provided humanitarian assistance to roughly 1 million Syrian refugees since its establishment in 2012. Ten years later, an estimated 5.6 million Syrian refugees require humanitarian relief. HHRD's MENA team is working in Jordan, Lebanon, and Turkey delivering relief through 13 programs.

Country Context

Jordan hosts one of the most significant registered refugees per capita globally: 1 out of every 15 people is a refugee in Jordan. Since the beginning of the crisis in Syria, Jordan, together with Turkey, Lebanon, Iraq, and Egypt, has shouldered the primary responsibility for hosting Syrian refugees. Most Syrian refugees in Jordan live in urban areas, outside of camps, and live below the poverty line. Refugees have put pressure on basic infrastructure, affecting both Syrians and vulnerable Jordanians. Women and girls are disproportionately affected as they are generally less empowered to access essential health and protection services. Ten years into the Syria crisis, more than 5 million Syrian refugees are still displaced into Jordan and neighboring countries. Since 2011, Jordan alone has provided refuge to more than 1.3 million Syrians, including 754,528 registered refugees, who face increasing vulnerability as their savings, assets, and resources are long exhausted. Around 126,000 of these refugees live in camps, while the remaining 83% have settled in urban and rural areas, primarily in northern governorates and Amman. In addition, 76,000 refugees come from Iraq, 15,000 from Yemen, and thousands more from 52 other countries seek asylum in Jordan.
