# **HHRD for Yemeni Refugees**

HHRD works globally, focusing on countries where most of the population lives below the poverty line. HHRD is on the ground in Somalia, providing clean drinking water and public washrooms through our Water for Life program. Our In-Kind Gifts program distributes medical supplies, clothing, food, and bedding to needy families in Jordan, Somalia, and Somaliland. Our Skills Development and Livelihood Program for students teaches self-sufficiency, and Ramadan food boxes provide nourishment to families during the month of fasting. In addition, HHRD continues to give educational support to orphaned children through our Orphan Sponsorship Program.

#### **HHRD Status**

An estimated 30,000 Yemeni refugees live in Somaliland and Somalia, where HHRD is registered as an International NGO. HHRD provides essentials to these families such as food packages and warm nourishing meals. These packages ensure children, the elderly, widows, and those living in poverty do not go hungry. HHRD will continue its food package distribution and health care provision through cataract eye operations in Somalia and Somaliland. In addition, winter provisions, seasonal projects, and gifts through our In-Kind program are being distributed to Yemeni refugees in Jordan, while seasonal projects are done in Djibouti. Routinely, HHRD teams conduct needs assessments to see the possibilities of initiating other main developmental programs of HHRD for the Yemeni refugees in this region.









## **Country Context**

A humanitarian catastrophe is underway in Yemen, where 24 million people, 80% of the population, need immediate assistance. Internal conflict and economic decline, now worsened by COVID-19, have killed, injured, and displaced countless people. With the lack of proper resources, citizens risk becoming the next mass refugee crisis. Thousands have fled to the Middle East and African countries of Djibouti, Somaliland, Somalia, Jordan. Many refugees fled across the Red Sea to Somalia and Somaliland, often in tiny fishing vessels. Somalia is one of the poorest countries in the world, and residents have historically fled the civil war to relocate to Yemen. Now, refugees from Yemen are streaming across the sea into Somalia. Yemeni refugees in Jordan share space and resources with refugees from Iraq and Syria. According to aid workers, Yemeni refugees in Somalia have minimal access to food, water, and medical aid.
