People don't like handouts; they don't want to be dependent. Helping Hand for Relief and Development's (HHRD) Skills Development and Livelihood Program (SDLP) recognizes this. Hence, the program was designed to give people dignity and selfesteem by teaching marketable skills that enable participants to take control over their own lives. Through offerings such as computer repair, automobile and motorcycle mechanic classes, culinary classes, solar panel installation, welding, henna and sewing we give people a way out of poverty, and mark a significant achievement in their lives. THE SOLUTION

SDLP does so much more than provide training. It promotes hope and self confidence. Some beneficiaries were literally unable to look people in the eye before taking part in the program. The skills they gain enable them to support themselves and their families, fostering a new sense of self-reliance and confidence. Participants can earn nationally recognized certificates in their fields. We equip high performing students with the tools they will need to get started in their chosen profession: a sewing machine for example, or a set of welding tools. Enterprise development training helps entrepreneurs attract clients, build their resumes, connect to the job market and develop soft skills.





PROJECT GOALS

Value based education promotes ethics and a sense of community to encourage people to support one another. SDLP was launched with the aim of contributing towards two of the United Nations' Sustainable Development Goals (SDGs): eradication of poverty and women empowerment. We seek to increase trainees' income level to the average Gross Net Income of their respective country. We put people in charge of their own lives, allowing them to stand on their own feet. The goal of SDLP is to serve humanity by helping people move from a place of suffering to sustainability.





Ultimately this is an investment in a permanent and more comprehensive approach to combatting poverty. While donors may not see a plaque with their name on it, a gift of resources has the potential to go further and help more people. Many of the beneficiaries share what they have learned by teaching others, and even develop the capacity to hire employees. This, in turn, leads to more people inspired and empowered, which creates a cycle of beneficiaries that use their skills to uplift their entire town. Together, we can break the cycle of poverty and create a new cycle of empowerment which flows down to the beneficiaries' children, families and communities.
