The Youth Empowerment Program is a comprehensive initiative designed to equip young people with the essential tools, knowledge, and resources necessary to play active roles in their communities. The program emphasizes personal development, education, and leadership skills, addressing critical challenges such as gaps in leadership, unemployment, substance abuse, and health issues. The overarching goal is to promote confidence, resilience, and social responsibility among youth, empowering them to make informed decisions and contribute to positive societal change.

The program focuses on identifying youth leaders across various institutions, particularly universities, to serve as key drivers of impactful change. Our team organizes pre-training sessions tailored for university youth leaders, creating a platform for brainstorming and collaborative problem-solving. These sessions are instrumental in uncovering the pressing challenges faced by young people, as well as identifying innovative and practical solutions to address them.

These sessions guide the program's structure and activities, ensuring they are aligned with the real needs of young people. Prioritizing dialogue and co-creation, solution oriented forums provide a foundation for sustained impact and continuous learning among the next generation of leaders.

It is our hope that by visiting refugee camps and seeing the important work being done from education support to water and sanitation projects, youth will become ambassadors for HHRD. They are encouraged to share their experiences through social media as well as print, photographs and documentaries.

"For the first week of this year, I traveled with 22 other young women with Helping Hand for Relief & Development (HHRD) to the

country of Jordan. During this trip, we met, visited, and worked with Syrian and Palestinian families who have fled their homes and have been relocated there.

As the school was being finalized into place, we formed a tunnel for the kids to pass through for their first walk into their new classroom. Everyone ended up running in, because they could not wait to see it on the inside. Soon, the new school was packed with all of the children, and we distributed school supplies and backpacks to get them ready for their first day." - Iman Hossain

Youth for Kenya

Typically once per year, a group of youth depart from America to experience a week doing humanitarian work Kenya. Participants distribute food, visit orphans and tour a skills development workshop.
